s a child, I loved reading about the Leaning Tower of Pisa.

It was a very special day for me when I finally went to Italy and saw its failed glory with my own two eyes.

Because that was what it was: a giant failure of the grandest proportion.

This cathedral bell tower was built seven hundred years ago. It began to sink on one side a few millimeters each year, causing it to lean. Efforts to repair the tower's foundation were also dismal failures—the tower kept on leaning to its side.

I can imagine how many sleepless nights the leaning tower gave its builders, architects, designers, owners, contractors, and engineers down through the centuries. When you think about it, the tower was one failure after failure after another failure.

But precisely because of this repeated failure, it has become a phenomenal success. For centuries now, millions of tourists have visited the tower because of its oddity, making Pisa a very prosperous city. If the tower didn't "fail" and instead stood straight, it would just be one of the many thousands of bell towers in Italynothing special at all.

Many people tell me that I've succeeded so much in my life. And everything I've set my mind on *happens*. They enumerate the many dreams I've had that has become reality: *Kerygma*, the number one inspirational magazine; The Feast and Light of Jesus Family; Anawim, our home for the aged; TrulyRichClub; etcetera.

One person asked me, "How do you do it, Bo? From mere thoughts in your brain, BOOM! We see it come true."

But people only see one chapter of my story.
First off, all of the things mentioned above were
created with a bunch of selfless people who didn't like
their names in the limelight. They let me have the glory
so my rewards in heaven will be miniscule compared to
theirs. (Drats.)

But here's another thing people don't know: about my other dreams that nose-dived and crashed to the bottom of the sea.

In 1983, I lived in a depressed area, dreaming of starting a community among the poor, plus a cooperative to assist in their financial needs. Nothing happened. Well, not exactly. Through that experience, I learned the art of sharing one filthy toilet with five families, two of which had eight children each. (I'm not exaggerating.) Needless to say, my

mornings there were very interesting. I acquired the skill of putting on hold my biological functions for two hours, my legs twisted together like a pretzel, while lining up and waiting for my turn.

In 1985, I wanted to start a Christian restaurant—complete with Christian music and food with biblical names. I also wanted to provide jobs for our unemployed members. That idea didn't even reach the oven. I wanted to serve dishes like Martha's full course meal and Moses' manna and Daniel's veggie meal and Esau's stew and Jonah's big fish and Tobit's liver, and Jacob's broken hip and heck, maybe I should thank God this whole idea didn't materialize.

Should I go on?

You can just imagine how many failures I've made in my life. I can write a thirty-volume encyclopedia entitled *The Failures of Bo Sanchez*. And that'll just be the index!

If you want the blow-by-blow account of how I failed, you need a one-terabyte hard drive. I've failed, and I've failed really bad. And at the time of the failure, people didn't mince words. I was criticized, ridiculed, lambasted, fried, roasted, grilled, baked, sautéed, stewed, and eaten alive. (See how my restaurant dream still haunts me today?)

But God knows how to use failures.

He masters in the art of recycling flops like me.

Failures in life are courses with very high tuition fees. So I don't cut classes and miss my lessons: about humility; about patience; about hope; about asking others for help; about listening to God; about trying again.

About trying again and again and again.

Lesson? I'm sure you have already failed many times in many areas of your life: family failures, job failures, spiritual failures.

Friend, if you want to be a great success, don't reject failures. Instead, use them. When you're able to use your failures, you bless the world with your unique gift.

He followed it up with the question on why we have their images. It's such a worn-out argument between Catholics and Born Agains that I had to keep my eyes from rolling as I gave a dispassionate reply.

Don't get me wrong. If he had been an ordinary Born Again Christian, I would have lovingly explained to him the rudiments of our faith regarding Mama Mary and the saints. But I had no desire to engage in apologetics with someone who was asking a question not to understand but to convince me of his stand. It was an exercise in futility since I knew that none of us would budge from our opposing beliefs.

Born Again Christians often criticize Catholics for praying to the saints but will not hesitate to ask a fellow church member to pray for their intentions. I think the problem stems from their misunderstanding of what "praying to the saints" means for us Catholics.

When we pray to the saints, we do not worship them or put them on equal footing with Jesus, or even with Mother Mary. (OK, that's another issue that deserves a full-blown article.) What we do is to ask them to pray for our intentions.

St. James said, "The prayer of a righteous person is powerful and effective" (James 5:16). Isn't this the reason why we ask those who are "malakas kay Lord" to help us pray for our petitions?

Tell me, if you could ask only one person to pray for your special and urgent petition, say a miraculous healing from a deadly disease, would you choose Bo Sanchez or me? (Go ahead and choose. I won't be hurt.)



Of course, you'd choose Bo, right? I would too!

My mom was my staunch intercessor when she was still alive. When I had difficult exams or when I was sick, I would ask her to pray over me. Now that she's in heaven beholding Jesus face to face, wouldn't her prayers for me be even more powerful? So yes, I still ask my mom to pray for me even if she's been gone from earth for years. I tell her to whisper to Jesus my needs even as I pray for those same intentions myself.

And because she has passed from this world, is it idolatry for me to keep a framed picture of her on my dresser? Am I worshiping her when I recall my happy memories with her and tell my kids about her? If I lovingly caress her picture as I remember all the wonderful things she had done for me, am I guilty of making her a god?

My Born Again friend told me that we shouldn't be talking to the dead. I agree. Using



sought a medium to conjure up dead prophet Samuel and ask advice from him. (Read 1 Samuel 28.)

But asking the saints to pray for us is not talking to the dead. Because our faith tells us that they are alive in Christ! Jesus Himself said, "Concerning the resurrection of the dead, have you not read what was said to you by God, Tam the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob? He is not the God of the dead but of the living" (Matthew 22:31-32).

As Catholics, "we believe in the communion of all the faithful of Christ, those who are pilgrims on earth, the dead who are being purified, and the blessed in heaven, all together forming one Church; and we believe that in this communion, the merciful love of God and his saints is always [attentive] to our prayers" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 962).

Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us rid ourselves of every burden and sin that clings to us and persevere in running the race that lies before us while keeping our eyes fixed on Jesus, the leader and perfecter of faith. (Hebrews 12:1-2)

St. Castorius


Feast Day: November 8

St. Castorious was a skilled carver in the imperial quarries of Sirmium, the present-day Mitrovica. Yugoslavia. and his colleagues-Claudius, Nicostratus, and Symphorianimpressed Emperor Diocletian with their art. They were hired to do several carvings. However. when asked to carve a statue of Aesculapius, a pagan god, they refused to do so, as they were Christians.

Diocletian ordered the imprisonment of Castorious's group since they declined to sacrifice for the pagan gods. They were also tortured and executed after being falsely accused of the murder of Lampadius, an imperial officer of Diocletian.

Castorious was one of the "Four Crowned Martyrs," and the patron saint of sculptors, stonemasons, and stonecutters.

Over 200 Catholic bishops from nine African countries attended the said event. The closing ceremony was held on July 22, 2018 under the subtheme "Celebrating Our Oneness."

I also wish to let you know my intense sadness when I see rules set for my brothers which are different from the rules that you set for me. I can't help but think: "Am I your real child?"

oth of my parents in Bacolod helped many of our relatives and even those who were not related to us. They believed that by adopting and sending these people to school until they graduated, they would be prepared to support their respective families in the future. So when my mom died in 2013, I took the liberty of bringing three of her recently adopted children to Manila, treating them as my own.

For some time, I was afraid because I was not equipped in so many ways. I was caught in a political conflict at work with my subordinates and the company owners. There was a time when I only had P50 in my wallet, enough for my fare. I had to explore options to pay for my debts, bills, rent, and meals. My then sevenyear romantic relationship became especially difficult. On top of that, I'd been worried for my father who was devastated after losing Mom. As if all that heaviness was not enough, our driver for my then Uber business raped our adopted child. It ripped my heart apart.

During those difficult times, I never stopped serving the Lord. God knew us from the very strand of our hair down to the blood in our veins. I trusted His Word that He would never leave me. He would never give me trials that I couldn't handle.

My previous boss invited me to The Feast where I found a home and family who cared for me through good and bad times. I drew my strength from The Feast every Sunday. I learned a lot from the talks and worship and it changed my personal outlook about life. Eventually, I served in the music ministry of The Feast Bay Area and now, in the recently launched The Feast Ermita. I learned about the essence of servant leadership and the importance of worship. I was further blessed when my adopted daughter gave birth to her baby Atarah, who, despite being born prematurely, came out alive and healthy by God's grace.

with my brothers in Christ Ricky Sy and Richmond San



hen my husband was battling a health crisis that happened for three Christmas seasons in a row (relatively the stressful time of the year), I was also tested beyond my limits. I told myself that I needed an extra dose of self-care so as not to give up. These were the times when I felt that I had to be on top of everything-home management, my husband's all-natural meals, the kids' activities, and all the holiday happenings. I was aware of how important self-care was. Yet when these things happened at the same time, I felt so drained. Every time my husband would recover, I would have an emotional meltdown. With much thought and will. I would sit down with my husband and discuss our need to tighten our individual self-care to ensure our wellbeing.

If we truly love our family and each other, we have to ascertain that we do not run on an empty tank. The love we give should come from the love within (and God is there within). It should encompass the different areas of lifephysical, emotional, mental. and spiritual.

Here are practical ways to do self-care:

1. Care for your body.

Choose a physical activity that works for you: walk by yourself, do an exercise routine at home, take yoga or tai chi class-something for the body and to clear your mind as well. Do not join the bandwagon on what physical activity to do. Choose what will give you a sense of being. The most critical vet most basic form of self-care is actually the hardest

2. Care for your needs. If

you are at your wits' end and there is much to do, each one being a priority, sidestep for a while. Yes, slow down. If it's not a matter of life and death, then let go for a while. Take fifteen minutes on a couch or comfy chair, get that much needed extra long shower, have a haircut, or maybe treat vourself to a good (healthy) snack before rushing through vour errands.

3. Care for your thoughts.

This one is tricky. How can we really care for our thoughts? It was said that our thoughts become

our destiny. And our well-being starts with a conscious awareness of what goes into our head. Who are you listening to? What are the recurring thoughts that get into your head? Are they healthy or not? Are they helpful? Are these giving you a sense of well-being and optimism? When we value caring for the self, we filter all those we hear, read, and allow to penetrate our brain. When you pause during mentally stressful times, listen to the sound of your breath, look up at the sky, stare at nature, or go for a good walk. These will help clear your mind.

4. Care for your heart. Have you ever experienced those times when your emotions cloud you? We have moments when our feelings overwhelm us and we want to break down. It's OK. When we feel hurt or angry, it's OK to respect our feelings. When we refuse someone, say no to a request that is too much for us, or when we do not want to socialize with anyone at some point, it's OK.


Why am I saying these are all OK? What happened to being the bigger person? There is a thing called emotional boundaries. It's protecting ourselves from further emotional burden, and we want to respect our

y grandaunt—the sister of my maternal grandfather—made the best ensaladang talong. When she prepared it, the whole house would be filled with the mouth-watering smell of inihaw na talong and I would wait expectantly for dinner time to come.

Eggplants are part of the nightshade family, and there are some people who are sensitive to this group of vegetables (so I would advise you to forego this salad if you are one of them). But eggplants are actually good for you especially for your digestion due to its high fiber content.

Naturally fermented coconut vinegar in this ensalada is another digestion

aid and having this salad in your meal can help you if you feel that your digestion is getting sluggish due to all the hard-to-digest food you have been eating lately.

Ingredients:

3 medium-sized eggplants 1 head of garlic 1/8 teaspoon salt 2-3 tablespoon of naturally fermented coconut vinegar Freshly ground black pepper

Use a fork or knife to pierce eggplants on all sides and grill (over hot charcoal or directly above the flame on the stove) until it is wrinkled and dark. Set aside to cool.

Then, mince the garlic.

Once the eggplant has cooled, carefully remove and peel off the darkened, cooked skin. Chop the eggplant meat into chunks then place in a bowl together with the minced garlic. Toss in the salt, vinegar, and pepper and let it stay for a few minutes.

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dvent is a time of preparation for the coming of Jesus. In order for our children to embrace the essence of the Christmas season, we have our Advent wreath and Jesse tree set up year after year.

The Jesse tree is a decorative tree put up during Advent to retell stories of the Bible that led to Jesus' birth. The Jesse Tree has it origin in Scripture: "There shall come forth a Rod from the stem of Jesse, and a Branch shall grow out of his roots.... And in that day there shall be a Root of Jesse, who shall stand as a banner to the people; for the Gentiles shall seek Him. and His resting place shall be glorious" (Isaiah 11:1-10). Jesus is a descendant of King David whose father was Jesse (Luke 3:23-38). It has three main parts-a tree, twenty-eight symbolic ornaments, and daily Scripture passages that go with it.

When you have young children, drawing their attention to doing these is usually a challenge. And often they will just go through the motions of doing it just to comply but get nothing from it.

First, what we did was to involve them rather than let them be mere spectators. As simple as drawing and coloring the ornaments of the Jesse tree, letting them read the Scripture passages (as soon as they learn how to read), and placing those ornaments on the tree (for the little ones) bring excitement and sense of involvement in them.

Second, in order for them to have a deeper understanding of the passages, we would share additional stories, insights, and reflections to reinforce the meaning of the symbol behind the ornament. Our children were able to see more clearly the trail of God's promises from creation to the birth of Jesus. They were able to know and identify the people whom God has called in order to accomplish His purpose. And because it is done every year, they become familiar with the symbols and the stories behind them. In this way, their appreciation of God's love strengthened.

Third, we added some personal touch to our Jesse tree by letting them write their thank you and/or good deeds on the leaves of the tree representing their gift offering for Jesus on this season.

As a family, having the Advent wreath and Jesse tree deepens our devotion to the Lord, and it allows us to celebrate His coming in a more meaningful and symbolic way.

In all of these, we recall the exhortation of God for the need for fidelity to His ways in Deuteronomy 11:18-20: "Therefore, take these words of mine into your heart and soul. Bind them on your arm as a sign, and let them be as a pendant on your forehead. Teach them to your children, speaking of them when you are at home and when you are away, when you lie down and when you get up, and write them on the doorposts of your houses and on your gates." <a>



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

omeone help my child, please! Help us!"
Wearing tattered clothes, filled with bruises all over my body, and carrying my paninda, I begged the doctors to attend to our four-year-old child. I rushed our second son to the hospital due to high fever and convulsion. I was crying in desperation because we didn't have money for down payment. A nurse assisted us to the emergency room and told me not to worry about the fees. Everything became a blur and all I could remember was there were people rushing around me and the sound of machines and announcement. The fatigue from waking up early, selling goods, and taking care of our children all on my own, plus the emotional pain of being an abused and neglected wife, took a toll on me. Exhausted, I sat on the floor as I watched the medical people save my child. I prayed, "Lord, please save my son. Please save us. I don't have any strength left."

As Psalm 34:18 says, "The Lord is near to the brokenhearted," He heard my cries and rescued us.



Unfaithful Husband

I came from a big family in Bicol. We are a brood of twelve, and my parents earned a living from a sari-sari store. But life was hard in the province. We lived near the sea so every time there's a typhoon, we would lose everything and start from scratch again. When I reached sixteen, I asked my parents' permission if I could study in Manila. They agreed, provided that I would work for my own allowance.

I became an ukay-ukay (thrift store) vendor, cashier, and an office assistant. During my second year in college, I met Marco*, one of the regular customers in the canteen where I worked as a cashier, and fell in love with him. He was also a persistent working student who wanted to be a succesful entrepreneur someday. When my parents visited me in Manila, I introduced Marco to them. My father, who was usually silent, told me something that I could not forget.

"Monica, be careful of that man. He looks OK, but something's wrong. Have you met his family and friends? Have you already visited his home? Please, don't be blinded. He might hurt you."

I could not understand my father. They asked me to break up with Marco. I rebelled. I quit studying, married him in a civil ceremony, and we eloped to Bulacan.

That's when my father's words started to make sense.

Marco and I lived in a small wooden apartment—a far cry from his promise: "We would live in my parents' old but spacious townhouse in Bulacan." The kitchen, bedroom. and sala were cramped in one room, and we had to settle with a bathroom that's enough only for a toilet bowl and a pail of water. The man who used to accompany me in church stopped me from doing anything Catholic because he actually belonged to another religious denomination which was very critical of my faith. Aside from that, he told me that his parents were businessmen and they wanted to teach him financial discipline that's why he worked as a student.

Lies. All lies.

I learned later on that he stole the hardearned money of his parents (who were farmers) and ran away to put up his own vulcanizing shop. He would hurt me whenever

his business attempts would fail and boss me around like I was his maid. I wanted to break up with him as soon as I discovered his true colors, but it was too late. I was three months pregnant. I refused to be intimate with him, so he started dating other girls to satisfy his needs. I let him be, as long as at the end of the day, he would come home to me.

Surprisingly, his unfaithfulness became a blessing in disguise. Since my parents and siblings were probably mad at me and I couldn't trust anyone in our place. I turned to God in my anguish. I would blame Him, then cry unto Him, and ask for His help. He became my pain absorber and constant confidant. Every time my husband was away, I would sneak out to the nearest adoration chapel and rest there. God's presence and Word kept me sane and hopeful that one day, things would be better.

But things turned from worse to worst.

A Plea for Help

Through the years, my husband continued to drift away. We had three sons, but he barely gave us an allowance. He got one of his women pregnant so even if we were the legal family, I felt like we're competing for his attention.

Thankfully, my family forgave me. After learning how my married life was going, they gave me enough money to start a small business of selling yema, polvoron, and pastillas. I learned those when I worked in a canteen.

I would wake up at three in the morning to prepare my products, attend to my children's needs, and cook our breakfast. We usually had tuyo for breakfast, salt for lunch, and soup made from broth cubes with a little vegetable for dinner. From six in the morning until dusk, I would sell around nearby barangays or even towns-on foot-just to have additional money for our expenses. My second child was often sick so we had to set aside budget for his medicines. Whenever I asked money from Marco, he would slap me and accuse me of giving our budget to another man. I would sell my products with large bruises on my face and arms. I continued praying for him and our relationship.


One evening, I found our second child suffering from seizure. I hurried to the hospital filled with despair, fear, and hopelessness. What would we do now? I couldn't contact Marco and I had two other sons who were starving.

Fortunately, God has His ways.

Starting Over Again

The good nurse who assisted us handed me an envelope with sufficient money for my son's medicine. He had pneumonia. I never got to thank the woman for all her help and I didn't see her once during my son's recovery in the hospital. Cliché maybe, but to me she is an angel sent by God.

My sisters also came to help. We took turns in the hospital while I cared for my two other sons. When we're about to bring my son home, Fely*, a kind woman whom I met in the pharmacy, asked if I was willing to be her supplier. She owned a chain of souvenir shops and she's looking for a trustworthy maker of *yema*, *polvoron*, and pastillas—my specialty. Praising God in my mind, I said yes.



It was the turning point of our life. I shared the good news with my sisters and they helped me put things together. My eldest child also offered a hand in making our products.

"Monica, I'm sorry."

I was startled when I heard Marco speak behind me. I was so occupied with our new business that I didn't notice him coming home to us every single night. Until that evening.

"I was a fool. I brought you and our family nothing but pain. Honestly, my business is doing well now, but I didn't want to share the news with you. I was so embarassed that it took me many years. I couldn't face you. I was frustrated with myself. I am sorry for beating you up. I'm sorry, Monica. I hope you can give me another chance."

I did. And I witnessed how much he has changed.

True enough, his vulcanizing shop was flourishing as he told me. He even named it to me and made me a partner. He left his mistress and we discussed how he will support his other son. We went to Bicol and he asked for my parents' forgiveness and blessing. He let me practice my Catholic faith and share it with our sons. On August 28, 2010, the feast day of St. Augustine, our family moved to our own two-storey house near the church where I serve as an officer of the parish pastoral council. God truly answers our most fervent prayers!

Sweeter Days

Today, aside from having our own home, we also bought apartments for rent. Our eldest son ventured into business and is very succesful on his own. Our second son is looking forward to enter the seminary next year, much to my delight. Our youngest is also an active servant in our parish.

Marco, meanwhile, continues to be a responsible and loving family man. He is very intentional in dating us and learning more about the Catholic faith. He is taking catechism lessons now as part of the preparation for his baptism next year. God is really good! I could only think of St. Monica's joy when St. Augustine finally had a conversion of heart.

Only the hands of God can put all the painful pieces of the past into a beautiful picture today and in the future. Looking back at the days when we had nothing for breakfast but fights and tears, I would never imagine that one day we will live happily-in our own home, managing our business, and serving our faithful God-together.

HAVE the greatest mom in the world. But like all human beings on the planet, she had her share of weaknesses, and one of them was a shackling poverty mindset—which she passed on to her kids.

When I was a small boy, I remember Mom bringing me to a shoe store to buy me a new pair. While walking around the various displays, I saw a lovely pair of leather shoes inside a covered glass shelf and pointed to them.

I say instead, "Boys, God has blessed us so much, we can afford to buy that thing. In fact, we can buy it now. But we're too wise to do that. We choose not to buy it because we want to put our money to better use, such as business, investing, and giving."

Today, I pray God will free you from a poverty mindset and replace it with a prosperity mindset.

Do you have peace? Then you are very rich.

"You prepare a banquet for me, where all my enemies can see me; you welcome me as an honored guest and fill my cup to the brim" (Psalm 23:5).

In this verse, the analogy shifts from shepherd and sheep, to host and guest.

Imagine yourself traveling in the desert, and your enemies—people who want to steal from you—are chasing after you. Suddenly, you see a huge tent with many men around it, and you run to it. The owner of the tent himself welcomes you into the safety of his house. And you see your enemies from a distance throwing a fit, kicking sand, and cursing in seven languages because they saw you beyond their reach.

Say this with me: Blessings are chasing after me!



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




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
The Feast Declaration of Abundance

few weeks ago, I had the privilege to listen to a lecture about succession planning for family businesses conducted by renowned author and speaker, Dr. Queena Lee-Chua. Her engaging manner of telling stories is often the highlight of her presentations, and in this particular session, she used an experience with a former student to emphasize the hazards of entitlement. "He was the only one failing in my class," she explained. "The worst part is it wasn't because he was incompetent. He was actually quite intelligent and definitely capable of excelling in his subjects. He was failing only because he refused to even try to pass my class. He never submitted his assignments and didn't bother to study for the exams. It came to a point wherein I had to talk to him directly about his lack of total initiative."

"I just don't see the point of putting in so much effort." That was his response.

"What do you mean? You need to pass because this grade will go on your transcript and that is the first thing that the human resource departments from multinational companies will check before they consider hiring you."

"Oh, that's OK. I don't need a transcript."

"How can you not need it?" At this point, her student was beaming confidently at her. "My dad told me that when I graduate, he'll make me the president of our company."

Dr. Lee-Chua could only reply with one statement.

"May God help your family business."

Everywhere you look today, there is a limitless amount of do's and don'ts when it comes to teaching our children to become financially independent. It can range from tips about allowances to something more sophisticated such as investing their savings. But what amazes me about children is that they already have the natural cognitive ability to figure these tricks out on their own, one way or the other. Surprisingly, our job as a parent is more than just giving them instructions and to tell them what to do or how to do it. Our main focus should be directed toward cultivating in them the proper habits and the right attitude when it comes to money management as early as now. These are the essential building blocks that are required and gained through the constant encouragement of our fathers and mothers. From here, through experience, they will eventually learn to piece together a financially secure future by themselves.

The Value of Money

There's a common saying that has been continuously shared for as long as I can remember: "Earned, not given." Ironically, this is often used mostly as a metaphor and in relation to aspects such as respect, relationships, power, and so on. But to take this literally and to heart may provide one of the most valuable foundations for effectively managing our personal finances.

The value of money increases when it is earned and not given. If you would like one solid nugget of wisdom on how to begin your journey, it doesn't get any more fundamental than that. We always assume that one peso is worth just one peso and that's it. But every peso that we accidentally stumble across on the floor varies in worth as compared to every peso made by someone who spent an entire week waking up early to rush through traffic, and to work painstakingly for eight hours each day plus overtime because they had a family to feed. In a way, this defines the curse that seventy percent of lottery winners experience when they suddenly find themselves multimillionaires one day and completely broke the next. This is also the reason why Dr. Lee-Chua made it perfectly clear to "never, ever tell your children that they're going to inherit your business until the moment that you will actually give it to them."

Our kids need to understand that money should be earned and as much as possible, it should never be given freely and endlessly without limitation. If we are aware that we don't need to work hard to enjoy a life of luxury and splendor, then why would we submit ourselves to the laborious challenge of building wealth? This manner of thinking breeds an entitled attitude and once that seed is planted into the mindset of your children, it becomes increasingly difficult to shake off as they grow older.

Parents, let your children earn their way to financial freedom. Let them learn how to open their own doors to the vast opportunities that may lie ahead and let them make the mistakes we all needed to make so we can develop a generation with a stronger, smarter, and more resilient character than their predecessors. This is not a call for us to be idle, however. Even if it's not within our scope to actually do their work for them, it is still our responsibility to stand by our children and offer guidance when necessary. You would be surprised at how our constant presence is already more than enough for them to find the will to succeed.

The Lesson of Restraint

This is the other common financial pitfall that many parents can't seem to escape from—too much stuff. As a mother, I actually find it more difficult to avoid spending for my kids than for myself. I can resist purchasing this handbag or those pair of shoes, but every look on my son or daughter's joyful face when they walk into a toy store makes me want to turn into Santa Claus and shout "Merry Christmas!"



on whatever random day of the year it may be. I would do anything for my child's happiness. And I am certain that you would as well. So we need to comprehend that if we want to guarantee the longevity of their happiness, we have to teach them about self-restraint and willpower.

The best way to accomplish this is by managing their expectations. Kids are highly susceptible to temptation and that's not their fault given how young and impressionable we all used to be at that age. When they watch a commercial or see their friends bring something to school, it's their natural response to want it for themselves. This is why it is important for us to take the time to explain what they can and cannot spend for and when the time is right to do so. Going back to the toy store, it has become our regular routine with my sixand four-year-old that we speak





to them briefly before they even step inside. We make it clear on certain days that they can browse but they cannot buy, and they have to affirm that they understand the rules before they are released into the jungle of shelves filled with their favorite things. They may walk out empty-handed but their bright smiles prove that the experience was just as enjoyable nonetheless.

There have been more than enough studies to prove that less is more and that having an excess of material things moves us further away from the intangibles that would make us truly rich. 
Leading by Example

was taking up Masters in Entrepreneurship in France when I randomly heard about the Philippines from AIESEC, one of the student organizations in my school. They were promoting an immersive experience in Gawad Kalinga (GK) communities.

At the time, France was going through a financial crisis. A lot of people lost their jobs. But I learned in the news how CEOs received the biggest amount of money while businesses were closing down.

I asked myself: What type of entrepreneur do I want to become? Do I want to be like the guys I see on TV who are purely driven by profit?

I was twenty-one years old then. I wanted to take a break and travel out of France. I checked GK online and sent them an e-mail.

GK founder Tony Meloto was then starting to build the GK Enchanted Farm in Angat, Bulacan. He envisioned it to be the first Farm Village University in the world. I knew that my profile as a masteral student of entrepreneurship would match Tito Tony's new plans. I decided to go to the Philippines to volunteer in the summer of 2011. I was supposed to stay only for three months, but here I am, seven years later. I didn't go back to France after my intership as I became more involved in the farm.

GK wanted to build sustainable change by putting up social enterprises—the type of business that is not just profit-driven but also purpose-driven. Tito Tony wanted the GK Enchanted Farm to be an incubator for social enterprises, like a Silicon Valley for social entrepreneurs.

I thought that having such a big dream was worth a try. I didn't want to return to the traditional way of doing business. I was young and I felt it was the time to take big risks. I really didn't understand what I was going to do with my life in France. GK gave me a sense of purpose.

When I first got to the Philippines, my English was not great and no one could speak French, so I got along better with children. I loved spending time and playing with them.

I saw how Filipino children grow up without toys. I thought it was unfair because it's part of the United Nations Children's Rights that every child should have access to toys to be able to play.

But I had no idea how to make a toy.

As I thought about the skills of the GK residents, I started thinking that toys could actually be manufactured and produced by the community. I thought of the wives of the carpenters who had a background in sewing. Bulacan was one of the provinces that was strong in terms of embroidery, it used to be the pride of the province. It's actually called Bulacan for a reason. Bulak means cotton. There was a time when Bulacan used to be the sewing capital of the Philippines.

Over the past decade, two hundred factories closed down with twenty-five thousand people losing their jobs. Many mothers at GK Enchanted Farm used to have sewing as their livelihood and they found dignity in it.

I applied what I learned from school, and beginning with one mother, Tita Fe, we created stuffed toys. I used my marketing skills and my network. I took advantage of my ability to communicate, to convince people, to run the numbers, and to make things work. That's how we started Plush and Play, one of the oldest social enterprises that was born in GK Enchanted. Since we were based

in a farm, we started making fruits and vegetable stuffed toys.

We started naming them after celebrities, because we wanted something that is connected with the Filipinos. We named our stuffed toys Manny Pakwan, Anne Kamatis, and Jessica Saging, among many other different characters.

We want to become the Hello Kitty of the Philippines. Today, we have fortyfive mothers making the stuffed toys. They are handcrafted inside their GK houses.

In 2015, we became the first Filipino toy to be sold in Toy Kingdom-the first local toy with a name and a story. We wanted to show that Filipino toys are world-class.

Handmade toys by Gawad Kalinga residents can be displayed side by side with Disney products. Today, we are producing five million pesos worth of toys a year, which includes corporate orders for customized items. Our toys range

from P179 to P749. They are available at Toy Kingdom in SM Megamall and at Ayala the 30th Mall. It's also available online through Lazada and through our website, PlushandPlay.com.

Being a social entrepreneur is like a cook whose job is to see value in every ingredient, in every little addition that they can add to the recipe. As you try to put things together, you make sure that everyone will benefit-your customers, and especially your community partners.

Tito Tony said a statement that I love so much: "Less for self, more for others, enough for all." This motto guides me in everything I'm going to do, not to be self-driven, but to be

more selfless. I'm doing it for people who are not blood-related to me. GK has expanded my definition of family. I have so many people in the Philippines whom I love and care for, many of them have become my inaanaks (godchildren).

So whenever I'm down, every time I'm close to giving up, or I face challenges, I spend time with my inaanaks like Micah, Daniel, and Nathaniel, and I am reminded that I want these children to have a great childhood and a better future.

You don't have to be rich to start a social enterprise. You don't have to be the smartest to start it. I started Plush and Play with only five thousand pesos. I started this social enterprise without



knowing how to use a needle and how to operate a sewing machine. The only thing I knew how to use was the scissors. But I bring my creativity and my learnings from school to launch the true genius of the community to produce world-class Filipino toys.

Don't look for excuses; just do something about it. It's time you believed in the potential of the Filipino.

Teaching Keys to Combining the Roles of Employee, Entrepreneur, and Investor

fter you make a decision to move toward entrepreneurship, there has to be unwavering followthrough.

Any path towards the achievement of anything monumental is always an unpaved road. You have to expect and face new challenges and obstacles that will arise. Uncertainty and self-doubt will not help. Remember, trying to be a successful employee, entrepreneur, and investor can be a tall order, and so it's easy to fall back

and think that success in just one or two of these areas will be enough anyway. It has to be a matter of design and not by chance. Don't settle for less or for what is comfortable. If you have been blessed with the potential and the opportunities, why not optimize on these and be a blessing to many, over and beyond your family and loved ones?

I believe the keys to combining all these three roles would be commitment, hard work, and discipline.

Commitment is very different from interest. Commitment is a steadfast focus on results. Again, no excuses-only results.

Being an entrepreneur and an investor requires more than just interest. Interest can mean doing something when it's convenient. Commitment is being completely accountable for results and the resolute determination for optimization.

This is why I'm so particular about having clear goals and objectives. I am a mentor to a number of people and I advise them to think the process through very well. If you'll start an investment portfolio or get into business only to try it out, please don't. You will just lose money, time, and some other vital resources. Do it with purpose and harmonize it with your overall life goals and objectives. Doing so will not just increase your chances for success but also make your success sustainable.

Hard work is essential as well. There is no replacement for it. You can't cut corners. Much like all the important aspects of your life, you have to give each endeavor the required time, effort, and nothing but your best.

I've heard from some friends that working smart is better that working hard. Why? Can't you do both? By working smart, you can strategize to be more effective and efficient, and you will cover more work with less time and effort. Therefore, you will have more time and energy to do other worthwhile undertakings that can make you more successful. So don't work smart and loaf around.

Work smart and do more. My children are adept at using technology in their work at the office, at home, or in

school. I'm amazed at the tools and applications that can help them organize, When I see what they are able to do with ease and at much less time, I ask, "Are you looking forward to having more time for leisure, or do you see this as an opportunity to further improve your work or output?" I ask you the same question. Do you see technology to make things easier, or as an enabler to do more and make things better?

Lastly, **discipline** is a basic requirement to be a successful executive, entrepreneur, or investor. An immense amount of it is a must if you want to be great at performing all these three roles at the same time. You have to be highly motivated, with a deep sense of self-control to stay on track to achieve your goals. Evaluate what you do in a given day and assess what will impact and contribute to your end in mind. Time management is not about managing time but managing yourself and what to put on your time. Understanding your timetable is also important. You're still an employee and you don't want to shortchange the company you're currently with. Since it's paying you a salary and giving you benefits, you have to give back more than what is

due. Giving more than what is due the company means devoting the correct amount of time for your tasks and ensuring results that are better than expected.

I was already an entrepreneur and investor when I was invited back to be the president and CEO of PAMI in 1995. Rampver Financials was already posting sizable revenues in 2005 when Ayala Land took me in. And in 2011, our company was already one of the country's biggest distributors of financial products and services when I was offered the president and CEO position at Philam Life.

I laid it all squarely on the table during those times. Even as I now accept directorships and other roles in other companies, I give full disclosure regarding Rampver and all the other companies that we have invested in.

By doing so, I'm giving people a straightforward message: I have the competence and discipline to perform given the multiple roles that I now handle. I have the capability to deliver on expectations for each of the tasks that I am compensated for. I'm not going to put my personal interest or the interest of my business when I handle other responsibilities in organizations that have put their trust in me.

I have multiple roles not just today but also in the past. I have never shortchanged any party in all of those roles. If I had a tinge of doubt about the way I was contributing, then I had to be the one to beg off. The fact that I continue having multiple roles today tells you that people are happy about my performance and they do want me in their teams.

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f we seek God for our own good and profit, we are not seeking God," said Meister Eckhart, OP.

Over the years, we have seen a proliferation of entrepreneurs and businesses. And businesses help the economy by providing jobs, goods, and services. If there is a business. profit follows. How do we know then that profit from business is a good one?

A good profit logically comes from a good business. And a good business is run by a good businessman. The Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches that "those responsible for business enterprises are responsible to society for the economic and ecological effects of their operations. They have an obligation to consider the good of persons and not only the increase of profits. Profits are necessary,

however. They make possible the investments that ensure the future of a business and they guarantee employment" (2432). Businesses and companies ensure that jobs are available to all without "unjust discrimination: men and women, healthy and disabled, natives and immigrants" (2433). Also, it is the business owner's responsibility to pay workers a just wage, for a "just wage is the legitimate fruit of work. To refuse or withhold it can be a grave injustice" (2434). A worker's wage should enable him to "provide a dignified livelihood for himself and his family on the material, social, cultural, and spiritual level, taking into account the role and the productivity of each, the state of the business, and the common good" (2434).

Good business is possible in this profit-driven, self-entitled world for as long as there are God-fearing and

upright businessmen who make good profit not only for business' sake but for everyone-customers, workers, and society.

In his book 8 Secrets of the Truly *Rich*, bestselling author Bo Sanchez writes that it is possible to "have the wealth of a millionaire and a heart of a monk." He shares that for one to be truly rich you must be a giver, and that wealth is not only about measuring how much money you have but by how much of that money is controlled by love. He challenges us: Earn to give. Earn not only to gain but to share. Earn not only to profit but to love.

Mark 8:36 reminds us, "For what does it profit a man to gain the whole world and forfeit his soul?" Indeed, those of us aspiring to get into business have a choice: to do business solely for profit or to do business with the heart, mind, and soul for good profit.



hen I study Scripture, I very seldom do one different verse a day. I stay on just one for many days. Doing a study every day is like wolfing down food-to me, at least. I don't want to rush through food that God feeds me. I ask Him to help me chew, swallow, and digest it. Then I scribble away on my prayer journal. I don't compose. I just write away. I start with "Dear God" or, "It's me again, Lord."

The other day, I was poring through Romans 8:31. "What. then, shall we say in response to these things? If God is for us, who can be against us?"



he Gospel about Jesus walking on water and Peter asking Jesus if he could also walk towards Him struck me. Peter was able to walk on water until he got distracted. His faith probably wobbled and he fell on the water. He forgot that he was a fisherman and knew how to swim.

I recall an incident related to this story. And I still can't help but thank God every time I remember it.

A New Adventure

In 2011, my friends and I decided to be adventurous. We went to Davao and tried white water rafting with some doctors from another hospital.

We were a big group. Fortunately, there were two kinds of boat: the big red rubber boat that can accommodate fifteen to twenty people and the blue small boat good for three to eight people. I don't know what my friend was thinking when he chose us to be separated from the others. Six of us rode the small boat while the rest of the group were all packed in two big red boats.

Before the adventure, the staff asked us to sign a waiver stating that we personally wanted to experience the activity. They showed a film on how dangerous it could be and taught us through video and enactment what to do if someone falls out of the boat.

The trip was exhilarating! We rejoiced every time we successfully passed by a whirlpool or raging waters and no one got thrown out of the boat. We saw some passengers in the big boat falling off the wild river and being rescued by their friends. We were so happy that

in our small boat of six plus one tour guide, none of us was thrown overboard. Our adrenalin rush pumped up that we did high fives using our paddle after surviving a difficult course.

Then our guide told us that we were nearing the final leg-the most dangerous river whirlpool.

From Thrill to Terror

He gave us a heads-up that he could not assure us we would not fall from the boat. We needed to do our best and paddle hard.


Then came the frightening moment.

The guide kept on shouting, "Paddle, paddle, paddle!" The water was so heavy and the current strong. We couldn't control the boat. Our combined strength was no match to the raging waters. The last thing we knew, we were flying in different directions.

The boat capsized and I found myself underwater. All I could see was the brownish water of the river. I was under the boat. As instructed during the orientation, I looked for the air pocket under the boat but I couldn't find one. Gasping for breath and holding on to dear life, deprived of oxygen and still unable to find the air pocket underneath the boat, I swallowed the brownish river water twice. I thought it was my end. I would drown to death.

Saved At Last

At that minute, I surrendered to God. I stopped fighting the current underwater, closed my eyes, and relaxed. After a few seconds. I felt myself being pushed down and up away from the boat. Suddenly, I perceived light. I opened my eyes and breathed easily. Finally, air filled my lungs. I floated freely. Then I saw the big red boat at a halt, waiting for me to get near them. The current brought me near my rescuers. I lifted the paddle which was still in my hand so they could catch it and pull



me close. It was such an ordeal. When they pulled me over the boat, I was spent. I was hyperventilating and at the same time grateful that I was still alive.

We were rescued one by one. Another friend who was trapped underneath the boat found an air pocket but the tour guide could not flip the boat to save her because one of our friends was clinging tightly on the boat's rope. People from the big boat were shouting at her to let go. I saw her face vanished many times under the raging water. Eventually, she let go of the boat. She floated towards us and was rescued. Only then was the tour guide able to flip the boat to free my other friend who was trapped underneath.

In this experience, I learned to surrender to God when I am at my weakest. Peter drowned when he lost trust in Jesus and started trembling because of the wind and the storm. I was saved when I surrendered my fate to Him and relaxed in His love. Only then did I find out that there were more than a dozen of people willing to rescue me. They were just waiting for me to reach out.

In life, we need to surrender everything to Him. And the people around us, our family and friends, are His emissaries to save us if we only acknowledge their presence.


